

Orange officials call Coat and Toy Drive a success

The citywide Coat and Toy Drive on Monday, Sept. 29 was a success, according to Orange West Ward District 3 District Leader William Hathaway.

"We had the kickoff at Sandwiches Unlimited on North Center Street yesterday and we raised \$750 so far for the coat drive," said Hathaway on Tuesday, Sept. 30. "I think it's a very good collaboration with the city and Mayor Dwayne Warren and the Orange Municipal Democratic Committee, where we can keep people warm for the holidays. It's something good, when you get away from the political season and everybody works together." Hathaway also said it was good for all sectors of city government and the community to be working together, "as we change the season going into the holidays."

"I think it was a very good effort on everyone's part," continued Hathaway. "It's all a collaborative effort. We, as a Democratic committee, are getting stronger by the day."

"We had low voter turnout in our last municipal election," said Hathaway. "So now we're trying to educate people about why it is important to vote. The (Orange Municipal Democratic Committee) is no longer silent. It's part of the community and we're doing this Coat and Toy Drive all the way through until December."

Hathaway said that, in addition to the Coat and Toy

Drive, he and other members of the Orange Municipal Democratic Committee were targeting younger voters on Saturday, Sept. 27, with a goal of registering voters and beefing up the city's voting rolls ahead of the November elections.

"On every other Saturday, we're trying to pinpoint locations throughout the city to do voter-registration drives. We did two voter-registration drives already — one in front of Radio Shack on Main Street and one in front of Walgreens on Central Avenue."

Communities prepare for second open enrollment of the Affordable Care Act

Following the first open enrollment session of the Affordable Care Act, also known as "Obamacare," which officials from Enroll America and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services have called a "great success," a second enrollment session is scheduled to begin Saturday, Nov.

Justine Ceserano, the state director of Get Covered America — a national campaign of Enroll America that educates consumers about the benefits of health coverage and the insurance available through the Affordable Care Act — said localized data released Sept. 22 will allow the organization and its partners to zoom in on what enrollment looks like on the community level in New Jersey, in preparation for the next enrollment period.

"It's great news that more than 112,691 New Jerseyans across these (10) counties got covered through the Health Insurance Marketplace, but our work here is far from over," said Ceserano on Sept. 22.

"With the next open enrollment period right around the corner, we'll be working nonstop with our partners, like Centers for Family Services, New Jersey Citizen Action, New Jersey Hospital Association, the Orange Navigators Project and many other members of the New Jersey for Health Care Coalition, to make sure that New Jerseyans get covered and stay covered. We also have recently expanded our

outreach to include more areas of Atlantic and Cape May counties, to ensure that we bring information to residents in communities where there is a demonstrated need for health care support in the South Jersey region."

Orange Mayor Dwayne Warren, the featured speaker at an Enroll America event at both the Orange Public Library and the St. Matthew AME Church earlier in the year, said he was glad to help and would support the next open enrollment session as well.

"The response to the work of Enroll America has been tremendous," said Warren on Tuesday, Sept. 23. "We hope that their valuable service continues in areas like Orange, where the health insurance deserts can become prevalent."

Enroll America is an independent nonprofit organization that is also the nation's leading health care enrollment coalition with a mission to inform consumers about the new health coverage options and how to enroll in them. According to the organization, in 10 of the 13 counties that accounted for 90.4 percent of enrollment in New Jersey, Get Covered America had volunteers working at a grassroots level to engage with the uninsured. The 112,691 New Jerseyans who were enrolled in health care during the first enrollment period broke down as follows: 20,144 in Bergen County; 15,443 in Middlesex County; 14,615 in Essex County; 13,428 in Hudson County; 10,486 in Monmouth County; See COMMUNITIES, Page 3

Lovett is sentenced to 31 years in state prison for killing Malcolm 'Ambitious' Bagley

Mark Lovett was sentenced on Thursday, Sept. 18, by Newark Superior Court Judge Robert Gardner to 31 years in state prison for killing Malcolm "Ambitious" Bagley in a drive-by shooting on Taylor Street in Orange on May

Lovett's family members were allowed to address the court to plead for leniency in his sentencing, but Gardner sentenced him to 31 years.

"Following a monthlong trial before ... Judge Robert H. Gardner, the jury deliberated for a day and a half before finding Lovett, 22, guilty of killing Bagley," acting Essex County Prosecutor Carolyn Murray announced July 14.

He was also convicted of aggravated assault for shooting another man, unlawful possession of a rifle and possession of a rifle for unlawful purpose. The jury acquitted Lovett of the more serious offense of murder. He was

also found not guilty of conspiracy to commit murder. After the verdict in Lovett's trial was announced July 14, Murray said

Gardner immediately revoked Lovett's \$1 million bail. Sharon Bagiey, Malcolm's mother, was in the courtroom at the sentenc-

ing, but declined to comment. Shawn Watford, 26, of East Orange, accused of driving the car Lovett was


in when he shot and killed Bagley, is scheduled be tried next.

Watford is also charged with murder, conspiracy to commit murder, attempted murder and weapons offenses; he is scheduled to be back in court


on Oct. 3, according to Murray and Assistant Prosecutor Romesh Sukhdeo. "We believe justice was served in this case," said Sukhdeo said on Monday, July 14. "Hopefully, this will bring some comfort to the victim's family.
